




QUICK IDEAS FOR

BOX GAMES



A cardboard box is one of life's greatest gifts to anyone caring for a child, and in this age of online ordering I find they are plentiful in our house. Below are some of the things we've done with boxes. (Of course, you can also just lob one at your kids and let their imaginations run wild!)


















1. JUNK ROBOT 31

Grab a big box, then get a load of random bits and bobs out of the recycling bin — small boxes, bottle tops, plastic bottles, bits of foil, etc. Then put it all together to create a robot! Use masking tape to stick things on. If you have stickers, use them to make controls and buttons. Great fun if you also cut holes for a person's head and arms in the big box, then let your little one become the robot!

2. RAMP RACE 24

Flatten out a big box by cutting through one edge, then write START and FINISH at either end. Set it up as a ramp off a sofa or chair, then race toy cars or trains down it either end. Set it up as a ramp off a sofa or chair, then race toy cars or trains down it. Who will win?



3. GUESS THE TOY 51

Cut a hole in one side of a box that's just big enough to fit a child's arm through it. Then put five toys inside the box and close the top. Get you little ones to poke their arm inside and describe what they feel. Can they guess which toy is which?
